HEALTH AND SPA TOURISM

In recent years the tourists are increasingly interested in health and spa tourism of Bosnia and Herzegovina, because the country is rich in high-quality thermal and mineral springs, health resorts and spas.

The Health Care laws do not distinguish between the private and public sector. According to the Law on Health Protection of the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina ("Official Gazette of BiH", number: 46/10) domestic or foreign persons or companies may be founders of private health institutions, including: clinics, general hospitals, special hospitals, spas, pharmacies, institutions for home care, for palliative care, and dialysis centers. According to the Law on Health Protection of the Republic of Srpska ("RS Official Gazette", No. 106/09) private health institution may be established by natural or legal person, including: family medicine clinic, dental clinic, pharmacy, special clinic, a special centres, hospital, institute for physical medicine and rehabilitation, institutions for home care, laboratory and stem cell bank.

Conditions for opening the health institutions in BIH are as follows:

- . To have employees with appropriate level of educational attainment, passed professional exam and license issued by the competent chamber, and for the special activities to have employees with adequate specialization or scientific/educational degree;
- 2. To have adequate diagnostic, therapeutic and other equipment for safe and modern health care
- 3. To have adequate space and facilities for the reception of patients, for diagnostic and therapeutic activities and accommodation of patients, as well as for the storage of drugs and medical devices;
- 4. To have adequate type and quantity of drugs and medical devices needed to do certain health activities;

- 5. To have adequate safety system in health institution;
- 6. To have adequate system for medical waste management in accordance with applicable standards, as well as special regulations;
- 7. To have opinion on the justification of the establishment of health institution issued by the cantonal and federal Institute of Public Health and adequate medical chamber (in entity Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina), respectively issued by the Ministry of Health and Social Security (in entity Republic of Srpska).

Based on the decision on fulfillment of conditions for performing health activities and on founding act, health institution should make registration at competent court register.

The belief in the curative powers of mineral waters goes back to prehistoric times. Such practices have been popular worldwide, but are especially widespread in Europe and Japan. Japan is maybe too far away, so you have come to the right place... Bosnia and Herzegovina, the heart of Europe... Until the beginning of 1990-ties, Bosnia and Herzegovina was well known and popular in entire region as a destination for health and spa tourism. Bosnia and Herzegovina is apparently derived from an old Indo-European word 'bosana', meaning water.

Usually nestled in beautiful surroundings with unspoiled nature and clean air, health resorts in Bosnia and Herzegovina offer true rest and relaxation, in addition to health care.

At present there are 15 health spas in BIH registered as health care institutions. There are located in the areas of Olovo, Fojnica, Bjeljina, Bihac, Srebrenica, Gradacac, Sarajevo, Kiseljak, Laktasi, Bosanska Dubica, Sanski Most, Teslic, Prnjavor, Banja Luka and Visegrad.

In last few years BIH has actively worked in development of its spas in order to offer better services to its guests.

"One of the prettiest places on the Earth ",

as E.B.Lanin wrote about Ilidza in The Contemporary Review in 1894 in London.

However, most of spas need investments in upgrading and modernization of existing facilities and programs, seeking for potential strategic partners to readjust their business models, management philosophy and marketing strategy.

Sutjeska national park is one of the first established in Europe and still holds the last remaining thousand year old rainforest Perucica.

A country also has the two swaps which are natural reservations and bird habitats. In the north, there is the Bardaca swamp, and the south Hutovo Blato – both have been declared destinations of an international significance by the Ramser International Convention about swamps.

The canyons, lakes, beautiful rivers, waterfalls, springs, and many more unspoiled natural resources have created a unique Bosnian eco tourism product. Furthermore, the villages in mountain regions, offer tourists the possibility to enjoy the special rural ambient with traditional hospitality, and rich culinary offer of domestic products.

BIH has numerous locations extremely suitable for eco, geo and ethno tourism development particularly in cooperation with capital investors.

Skiing, hiking and alpinism tradition in Bosnia and Herzegovina has existed for over a hundred years, but the expansions of winter tourism came after the XIV Olympic Games held in 1984 in Sarajevo. Tourists and especially skiers say that you can find everything in Bosnia and Herzegovina: the perfect ski slopes of Jahorina, the best alpine skiing track on Bjelasnica, and the massive, tall and absolutely tame and open Vlasic, and harsh Kupres, and colorful Igman.

The Olympic Mountains Jahorina, Bjalasnica, Igman, Trebevic and Vlasic, as well as recreation centers of Kupres and Risovac, and ski resorts on Kozara, Busovaca, Ostrelj, Vlasenica, Vranica, Borje and others, offer more than 60 kilometers of perfect ski slopes.

The British Telegraph in 2015 ranked Jahorina in the top 10 ski destination in Eastern Europe.

Sarajevo, the national capital hosted the 1984 Winter Olympics, which, at that time, were the largest Winter Games ever (in terms of athletes and media). Also, the host of the EYOF 2019 Winter Youth Festival ware the cities of Sarajevo and East Sarajevo.

The mountain centres are ideal for development of winter, sports, recreation, hunting and fishing tourism. Undoubtedly, Bosnia and Herzegovina has the strongest comparative advantages compared to other countries in the region.

At the moment all these huge potentials and opportunities are only partly exploited and numerous investment chances are offered to foreign investors including: investment in vertical transportation,

infrastructure, ski slopes, accommodation and other facilities. With further development and capital investment, the mountain centres of BIH can offer the diverse and quality tourist offers, which can fulfill the needs of the most demanding tourists.

National Geographic ranked Bosnia and Herzegovina among the 10 best adventure destinations for 2012. Among the destinations that offer excellent rafting, mountaineering, skiing and other adrenaline sports, BIH was named as offering the best mountain biking trails.

In 2009 Rafting World Championship was successfully organised in Bosnia and Herzegovina at the River Vrbas and The Rivera Tara.

ATA (Association of Adventure Tourism BIH) represents BIH outdoor tourism in international fairs (i.e. 2011 Outdoor Retailer Summer Market (ORSM) - Salt lake City, Utah; Adventure World Travel Summit – Luzerne, Switzerland). ATA currently has eleven members offering diverse programs that include: hiking, rock climbing, mountain biking, kayaking, rafting, canyoning and fly-fishing.

SEA TOURISM

With its 23 kilometres of the Adriatic coast and 240 sunny days every year, Bosnia and Herzegovina each year attracts more tourists from all over the world. 





SOME SUCCESS STORIES OF THE SECTOR

In 2018, TRB company introduced a new product - the Despot armored vehicle. Despot is designed to carry out a vast range of missions from police units to armed forces. Despot presented at the "International Defence Exhibition and Conference" (IDEX) Fair in Abu Dabi in February 2019. This year, TRB company will present a new product - a prototype vehicle, a light combat vehicle (intended for five people), which was made in cooperation with the Ministry of Interior of the Republica Srpska (MUP), ie with the Special Anti-Terrorist Unit. Also, TRB will build a factory in Banja Luka or its surroundings in the next 12 months.

The company "Igman" from Konjic opened a new line for the production of ammunition and this year it is planned to hire about 100 new workers. This Bosnian giant of the purpose-built industry "Igman" from Konjic celebrated its 72nd anniversary this year, and on that occasion, opened a new production line of 7.62 mm caliber ammunition (the production of this caliber of ammunition is increased by about 50 million pieces per year).


The defense industry is an export-oriented sector and among the five industries that achieve the best results in B&H when it comes to foreign trade.

According to the Foreign Trade Chamber of Bosnia and Herzegovina, in 2021 it regitered an export of approximately 120 million €, while in 2014 it was about 48 million € (tariff 93). Explosives (tariff 36) exported €, 23.03 million in the previous year. That means that exports of arms and ammunition; parts and accessories thereof from Bosnia andHerzego-

vina were almost tripled in the last six years. If we compare with the previous year, we

see a growth in exports of 18% (in 2020. smaller exports are caused by the COVID-19

pandemic).



Leading markets – USA, Egypt, Czech Republic, Turkey - take part in over 60% of BiH export of weapons and military equipment. Dedicated production of BiH is concentrated on the production of ammunition so that the export of this group of products is more than 75%, slightly more than 16% on explosives, and 11% on parts of weapons.

One-third of exports went to the United States.











According to the latest detailed data available, the main BiH Arms and Military Equipment (AME) importers, were Italy, South Africa, Germany, Turkey, USA, Serbia, Czech Republic, Croatia, Slovak Republic, and Slovenia.



DATA FOR THE FEDERATION OF BOSNIA AND HERZEGOVINA

The military industry in the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina records higher business results than planned by the "Strategy for the Development of Military 2,000 Industry in the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina for the period from 2012-2022". In 2020 business results were realized at approximately 220 million BAM.



Currently, 3708 workers are employed in this industry of FBiH, while the average salary is 1023 BAM or 538 euros.



FOREST RESOURCES

Forests in Bosnia and Herzegovina cover a large part of its territory (according to recent data, forests and forest land in BiH cover an area of 3.231.500 hectares or 63.3% of the total area of BiH) and contribute effectively to the territorial and biological balance. New data indicate the existence of as many as 435 million m³ of wood stock, which amounts to 201 m³ / ha.

Wood and timber are undoubtedly an important resource of each country that generates local

economic growth and significantly influences the creation of jobs in rural areas. Due to their natural and diverse structure, as well as significant natural regeneration, forests have been given the status of the key resource for further development of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The main types of trees are meals, spruce, pine, beech, oak, maple, elm and fruit trees (cherry, apple, pear). It should be emphasized that beech and oak from Bosnia and Herzegovina in the production of furniture is a highly valued raw material, which additionally opens many doors in the world to B&H manufacturers.



Lately, ecological, economic and social demands towards forests are increasing, and pressures on climatic conditions have been increased. This requires additional efforts both for increased coordination of all activities and encouraging different forms of cooperation, as well as for encouraging greater application of innovations within the sector. These demands, and especially the pressures, tend to be continuously increasing, because, apart from the traditional economic benefits of timber raw materials, as time passes, significant contribution to the social, climate and energy development and the country's position as a whole will also be important.

On the existing raw material basis, a strong wood industry has been developed. The industry which has a long tradition of producing a very wide range of wood products. Its development is based on the use of domestic natural resources and it is traditionally export-oriented.

Until the 1990s companies from this sector were known around the world, and Bosnia and Herzegovina was the second largest European furniture exporter, right genind Italy.



The wood sector includes the following activities:

- Forestry and forest exploitation and related service activities;
- Processing of wood and wood products and cork;
- Manufacture of paper and paper products;
- Manufacture of furniture, other processing industry.

The most important advantages, ie the strengths of the BiH-wood processing sector are:

- Tradition of industrial production
- Low labor costs
- Domestic raw material basis
- A favorable geographical position, or proximity to the European Union market.

The unused opportunities and possibilities of the bh wood processing sector are:

- Increase the degree of product finalization
- Foreign investment in the sector
- Low trade barriers
- The image of the European manufacturer

Undoubtedly the enormous forest resources available to BiH represent a significant comparative advantage of the country in relation to neighboring and other European countries.

CERTIFICATION OF FORESTS AND PRODUCTS STANDARDIZATION

Two key effects are achieved by certification of forest resource management. First of all, it improves the performance of the business, with the aim of achieving sustainable management of forest resources, as well as increasing the competitiveness of the company, since it is one of the specific criteria that the EU market demands when it comes to the export of BH furniture and proof of the origin of the raw material.

FSC is a global generic standard recognized as the highest social and environmental standard for forests. FSC (Forest Stewardship Council) certification means that the forest is managed according to strict environmental, social and economic standards. BiH. as well as the surrounding countries, have chosen this standard and certified forests according to the FCS Sandarwood. In the RS, all state forests are certified and resertified according to the requirements of the FSC standard (Forests

of the Republic of Srpska). In the Federation, the companies with a forest management certificate are ŠGD Hercegbosanske šume d.o.o. Kupres, JP Forests of Tuzla Canton and Una-Sana forest d.o.o. Bosanska Krupa and Sarajevo-forests started certification for forestry production ¹. Private forests (either in the RS or in the Federation of BiH) doesn't have this certificate

FSC® CoC (Chain of Custody) - International certification for wood from sustainable forests which proves that wood parts of the certified product are traceable to well-managed forests, controlled sources or recycled materials. This certificate is particularly important after the entry into force the EU TR 995/2010 (European Tree Regulation) setting a barrier to the trafficking of illegal forestry activities to be placed on the EU market. Manufacturers of timber products covered by this regulation will have to provide their customers in the EU with complete information on the product with objective evidence that the wood does not originate from illegal sources. FSC CoC is a trace of product information from forest to buyer including all stages of processing, transformation, production and distribution where further processing involves the change of ownership.

In accordance with EU Regulation 305/2011 on construction products from 2013, it is mandatory to have a CE mark for unhindered traffic on the European market. Precasily defined products and groups of wood industry products that are built into the building must have the CE mark.

Establishing a center for quality in the woodworking industry - Since 2014 in BiH (Zenica) within the Center for excellence in wood (CID), there is an accredited Furniture Testing Laboratory (LIND), which (the only one in BiH) meets the requirements of the standards BAS EN ISO / IEC 17025: 2006, and as such, it provides services for testing the mechanical

properties of furniture and equipment for children's playgrounds, which until now have been provided only by accredited laboratories abroad. Activities on the expansion of laboratory services are underway to examine building joinery and façade elements. Laboratory services have been made available to BH producers of furniture who want

to obtain certificates of conformity for their products and that are ready to respond to sophisticated export requirements to the EU market and beyond.

With the support of the international USAID-SIDA FIRMA project and its successors, activities on the establishment of the Quality Center are also in progress, also within the Center for Excellence in Wood (CID). The support of international projects for the development of these and similar capacities in BiH will continue, with the aim of further improving the business environment in the wood sector.

MACROECONOMIC INDICATORS (SECTOR IN NUMBERS)

Volume of industrial production:

The increase in gross value added of the wood sector (three activities) in 2018 compared to the previous year was 9,84 %.

The contribution of the processing industry to GDP growth in 2018 was 13,23 % of which the contribution of the wood sector was 2,12 % (excluding forestry and forest exploitation).

Bearing in mind that by 1992, the participation of the wood sector in the gross national income of BiH was about 10%, there is still plenty of room for improvement.

Foreign trade:

In the structure of exports of wood sector, the largest part relates to exports of products from the activity production of furniture - 48 %, then to - wood and timber processing – 34 %. Furniture is mostly exported to European countries. Wood products foreign trade occupies an important place in the overall economy of BiH. In favour of this goes the constant multi-year surplus in this sector that are realized. The coverage of import by export in the sectoral foreign trade in 2019.godini amounted to 190 %. The volume of foreign trade of the sector makes 9 percent of the total volume of foreign trade in BiH, and participation of export of these four activities in total BiH exports is 16 % in 2019. The export achieved in 2019. in all four Sector's activities, reduced by 10,18 % compared to:

Number of companies and employees in the sector.

Wood industry of Bosnia and Herzegovina is organized within a large number of small and mediumsized enterprises, mostly privately owned.

These companies produce a wide range of products: furniture, furniture elements, construction joinery, parquet floors and flooring, sliced materials, massive plates. According to the statistical business register managed by the Statistics Agency of BiH in the middle of 2019, 1 560 enterprises were active.

According to the data of the statistical institutes of the Entities, the woodworking sector (with forestry) in 2019 employed 41.387 workers (of which in primary processing 11,741 (28.37%), and in the final 29,646 or about 71.63 %), i.e. 361 workers more than in 2018. or 24.73 % of the total number of employees in the BiH manufacturing industry.

In the wood industry of BiH the highest number of workers are with secondary education (more than 60%), while the participation of unskilled workers is about 20%, and there are only 2% highly educated workers (despite the existence of 4 institutions for higher education in forestry and wood processing in BiH).

The average net wage per employee in the sector varies depending on the activity, and the highest is in forestry (state-owned enterprises) 968 KM, while the lowest is in the processing of wood and wood products (516 KM). In the production of paper, the average net salary is 879 KM, and in the production of furniture the average net salary is 603 KM per employee.²

INVESTMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Numerous possibilities for inflow of both, foreign and domestic capital, lie in the revival of former large industrial capacities (Krivaja Zavidovići, Konjuh Živinice, Sana Sanski Most, Sanica Ključ, Borja Teslić, Romanija Sokolac, Šipad Sarajevo and others) that were the bearers of the economic development of Bosnia and Herzegovina. For potential investors, companies that are in bankruptcy proceedings may be interesting. Bosnia and Herzegovina also needs investment in forestry infrastructure and new forest exploitation technologies that will enable the increase in the utilization of timber, especially logs of smaller volume and lower-quality, in order to create new products with higher added value. The traditional production of high-quality solid wood furniture in a small and medium-sized enterprises

in BiH is also a great investment potential of the BiH wood processing sector.

The availability of unused biomass in BiH remains very high. It is estimated that, per year, around 800,000 tons of biomass in BiH remain unused. Investors are currently interested in the use of wood biomass for the production of pellets and wood chips, intended for the production of ecological heat energy. The use of wood biomass for the production of particle boards, despite certain concrete interests, still does not occupy an adequate place in the BiH wood processing sector, so there are significant investment potentials which are unused.

ENERGY SECTOR OF BOSNIA AND HERZEGOVINA

Gross electricity production in Bosnia and Herzegovina in 2020 was 16 874GWh, out of which 4 663 GWh or 27.6% was produced in hydro power plants and 11 557 GWh or 68.5% in thermal power plants, and 654 GWh (3.9%) was produced in autoproducers and others (wind and solar power plants). Own consumption in power plants was 1 240 GWh, and 304 GWh in other energy sector. In final electricity consumption in 2020 households participated with share of 48.3%, industry with share of 25.4% and other consumers including construction, transport and agriculture with 26.3%. The largest share in final electricity consumption in 2020 at industry sector had Iron and Steel Industry with 23.5% while Food, Beverages and Tobacco Industry participated with share of 13.8%

BIH remained at first place in the region with exports of electricity. The value of electricity exports from Bosnia and Herzegovina in 2021 jumped 66.9% against 2020, to about EUR 424 million, reaching an all-time high.


1 st March 2016 BiH joined in Brussels the International Energy Charter - successor of the European Energy Charter, as the 76th member state.





68 ATRACTIVE SECTORS

Gross electricity production in Bosnia and Herzegovina was 1948 GWh in February 2021. In total gross electricity production hydro power plants participated with the share of 48.8%, thermal power plants with 49.5% and solar and wind power plants with 1.7%.





■ ENERGY SUBSECTORS

B&H energy sector encompasses the following main subsectors:

- Coal
- Oil & Natural gas
- Power generation

COAL

Coal is one of the most important energy resources in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Major deposits of lignite and brown coal are sited all around Federation of BIH (FBIH) and Republic of Srpska (RS). Most of the existing coal mines fuel thermal power plants (TPP) in both entities. Coal mines situated in Northeast and Central Bosnia serve two TPPs, Kakanj and Tuzla, operated within the company Elektroprivreda Bosne i Hercegovine (EPBIH), whereas Ugljevik Coal Mine and TPP, and Gacko Coal Mine and TPP are operated within the company Elektroprivreda Republike Srpske (EPRS).

OIL & NATURAL GAS

Bosnia and Herzegovina is predominantly dependent on import of the liquid fuel and natural gas. A total of about 150 million USD were invested in oil and gas exploration, and the results indicated that both areas were rather perspective in terms of oil and gas prospecting. The oil and gas exploration results in Bosnia and Herzegovina justify further explorations and indicate that there are realistic possibilities of finding commercially viable deposits.

OIL

Bosnia and Herzegovina oil industry encompasses imports and refining of imported crude oil and production of petroleum products.

The BiH oil sector developed significant production capacities, comprising two refineries based on the most up-to-date world technologies, but presently only partly employed, including: - Refinery Brod, which capacity is 4 million t/year, processes imported crude oil into various products (motor fuels, liquid petroleum gas, bitumen, etc) - Refinery Modriča, which produces motor oils and various special purpose technical oils for the industry and other commercial purposes.



NATURAL GAS

Within Bosnia and Herzegovina energy sector the gas subsector is the least developed and the development of the gas sector in Bosnia and Herzegovina is unquestionable in terms of strategy. Currently, the gas is procured/imported over only one pipeline, with the length of 191 km and the projected annual capacities of 1 billion m3. The demand projections until 2020 amount from 1.5 to 3 billion m3 of gas, foreseeing serious gas sector reform and development, which comprises:

- Construction of an alternative supply route
- Distribution network development
- Construction of the underground storages
- Diversification of the gas supply sources, etc.

The option of substituting the imported natural gas with the gas produced by coal gasification is under consideration too.



POWER GENERATION

Electricity is predominantly produced in hydro and thermal power plants. Currently, the production facilities, with total installed capacities of 4000 MW, exceed the domestic demands and the electricity is exported. In 2018, in Bosnia and Herzegovina, production of electricity amounted 17,873 GWh, (18,0% more than in year 2017), because of exceptional favorable hydrological situation and production growth in Hydro Power Plants of 6 300 GWh. Thermal Power Plants produced 10.954 GWh. Generation from Renewable Energy Sources (wind,small hydro and solar power plants) recorded amount of 602 GWh.

NEW POWER GENERATION PROJECTS DEVELOPMENT

Intending to harness the substantial and diversified energy resource base in Bosnia and Herzegovina, all relevant stake-holders in Bosnia and Herzegovina are adopted development and investment programs for construction of new generation plants, entirely respecting recommendation from EU Directives 2003/54 and 2009/28.

Significant investments in new power system facilities and expansion of power generation capacities are foreseen by these programs, in order to meet growing electricity supply deficit within regional and larger European markets.

Investment programs encompass a number of the development projects, based on coal, hydro and renewable energy sources, including both expansion of existing and construction of new power generation capacities.

LARGE THERMAL POWER GENERATION PROJECTS

There are a total of five new coal-fired thermal power generation projects, with potential electricity production capacity of approximately 2000 MW.



MINI HYDROPOWER PROJECTS (CAPACITY OF 5 MW OR LESS)

In the Bosnia and Herzegovina, river basins there were identified over 400 potential micro locations for construction of the mini hydro power plants, enabling cumulative increase of the electricity production capacity of approximately 1000 MW.

WIND ENERGY POTENTIALS

The world wind atlas and results of last 15 years wind speed measurement in Herzegovina regionshown that the southern part of Bosnia and Herzegovina is the most perspective for wind power plant development.

The estimated total wind power potential at 18 selected locations is 1030 - 1180 MWwith electricity production of 2.4 TWh/year. Average utilization factor of 30% represents the top level of productivity, even in European terms.

However, the total wind potential in B&H is probably much higher, in the order of 2000 MW.

This estimate results from the analyses of available space, but doesn't take into account possible limitations (like grid integration possibilities, environmental protection, etc.). The connection capacity of wind farms to the transmission grid, of 350 MW is distributed between two entities in the ratio of the amount of 230 MW for Federation and 120 MW for Republic of Srpska.

Accordingly, B&H Transmission Company issued approval in principle for wind farms:

- 1. Koncig d.o.o. Posušje WF Debelo Brdo (54 MW)
- 2. Lager d.o.o. Posušje WF Gradina (26 MW)


SOLAR ENERGY POTENTIALS

B&H resources of solar radiation energy is above the European average with very favorable seasonal schedule, and possibility for its effective and long-term use. The theoretical potential of solar energy amounts about 74.65 PWh. It can be said that B&H is one of the most favourable locations in Europe, where solar radiation is concerned. The solar irradiation values vary accordingly with about 1,240 kWh/m2 in the north to 1,600 kWh/m2 in the south where the number of sunny days can reach 270 days per year with a solar thermal potential of approximately 1,900 TWh. Irradiation map in Bosnia and Herzegovina is the main indicator for the selection of locations for solar power plants. Potential locations are identified in the region of Herzegovina and Western Bosnia, with around 10 500 ha of available surfaces. Potential installed capacity for photovoltaic power plants is 4010 MW that is 10% more than the total installed capacity in the existing power plants in B&H.

Capacity of transmission network for integration of PV power plant in 2020, amounts 565 MW.

MINING AND METAL PROCESSING SECTOR IN BOSNIA AND HERZEGOVINA



Metal production sector in Bosnia and Herzegovina is one of the most important industrial sectors in the country with the tradition longer than a century. Metal sector is particularly export oriented sector with the total export share of about 35 - 39 % of the total revenues*.

B&H metal processing has traditionally been one of the strongest bh sectors by offering a strong human and resources base as well as a long tradition enabling sustainable development of various value-added businesses, export oriented in particular. First industrial capacities of the metal sector developed from the craft workshop for maintenance of the coal mine equipment and salt.

B&H metal sector has permanent and robust production growth rate of over 10% within the past few years, being strongest exporter in B&H economy.

Metal industry is one of the most important industrial sectors of the whole region based upon the following data:

- Long tradition in the metal processing industry Developed advantages at the international market
- Abundance of production facilities and industrial zones
- Skilled and affordable labor force
- Available production capacities
- Export oriented sector (app. 39% of the total export)
- No restrictions for foreign partnership with domestic companies
- Industrial average price, without VAT was 6.61€ cent/kWh (IC group buyers), metal processing sector in Bosnia and Herzegovina is strongly export oriented, exporting in average 90% of the production to the thirty countries all over the world.
- Natural recourses /law cost sourcing of input / low cost of production,
- Qualified, trained, motivated and at a price competitive labor force,
- Available infrastructure and inputs,
- · Good export opportunities including geographic position and incentives,
- Sector supported universities, research and development institutions and design and engineering companies.



The metal sector in Bosnia and Herzegovina has a long history, great potential and competitive advantages due to the existing stocks of row materials and competitive prices as well as a long tradition that enables sustainable development of various activities. The processing industry is quite diverse and includes the production of base metals - iron, steel and alloys, powder metallurgy, metal processing and coating as well as general engineering. The focus of this analysis is on the production of the finished metal products, except machinery and equipment. The key obstacles in this sector included the inability to expand to a new market base (new buyers), high costs of obtaining certifications and implementing standards required by the EU, and the lack of skilled workforce. The sectors with high export potential within Metal Processing industry were automotive sector, cable industry, and metal processing of black and aluminum metals orientated towards EU markets. To expand to new market base, it was assessed that companies needed to attend trade shows and connect with buyers through trade missions and business-to-business meetings. Furthermore, to reduce the costs of fulfilling EU standards, export recognition status was required. To improve workforce development, adult practical training and adjustment of formal curricula to meet current and future industry needs, were identified as essential.

SUCCESFUL COMPANIES

According to the data of LRC BIS – Business Intelligence System, potential investors in the metal processing sector should be aware of the following company numbers and increase percentages. In 2016. total number of registered metal processing companies was 822, while 2019. The number of the companies has raised up to app.1200 what is significant increase for the country as Bosnia and Herzegovina is.

It has been noted that 56,3% of the companies generates revenue about half a million KM (250 000 Euro), 33.3% of the companies up to 5 million KM (2,5 Million Euro) and about 10.4% more than 5 million KM (2,5 Million Euro).



Furthermore, few successful stories from foreign investors may be a positive sign for new investment activities.

Jajce Alloy Wheels (Germany)

Jajce Alloy Wheels is a manufacturer of aluminum wheels and a free market. In the production program, the cross sections of 10 to 22 inches are available for different types of cars. Jajce Alloy Wheels produces wheels by the design of Brock Car Fashion, as well as at the request of other customers who have their own design tools.

The history of the factory in Jajce has its roots since the early eighties when the then giant Energoinvest from Sarajevo and Bauxite Mines Jajce built a foundry facility. In the mid-1980s, the foundry began to work, and then the technology of low-pressure casting of aluminum was adopted. The factory had the so-called. "golden age" at a time when "Red Flag" Kragujevac exported cars to the United States. The then production record of the foundry was 107,000 wheels of an average diameter of 13 cols and a mass of 7.5 kg. The owner of Brock Group, Mr. Hans Hubert Brock and entrepreneur Miroslav Leko, who returns home after twenty years of work in Germany, decided to start production of aluminum alloy wheels. Thus, in the fifth month of 1998, the company Jajce Alloy Wheels d.o.o. After the reconstruction of facilities from war victims and the purchase of new machines, the production was launched on February 22, 1999.





FDI Share in metal and electro industry – 2020/ Investment activities within the total foreign investments in the metal sector December 2020 - in percentages:





Production of the motor vehicles and base metals for the period from 2010 - 2021





Metallurgy and Mining

Bosnia and Herzegovina is abundant in various natural mineral resources, particularly in large deposits of coal, bauxite, iron and limestone.

The main energy resource of B&H is coal (brown coal and lignite), with estimated reserves of 8 billion tons. Coal is one of the most important energy resources in Bosnia and Herzegovina. Major deposits of lignite and brown coal are sited all around B&H. Bosnia and Herzegovina has an estimated 653 million tons of iron ore deposits concentrated around Liubija and Jablanica.

Bosnia and Herzegovina has significant deposits of non-metal and other industrial minerals, such as salt, limestone, asbestos, pyrophyllite, kaolin, gypsums, clays, (china clay), dolomite, silica sand, stones, gravel (aggregates), sand, and other minerals. In order to benefit from those huge potentials mining sector requires substantial reforms and restructuring as well as modernization of all exploration and exploitation segments. It could be achieved through the introduction of new technologies.



It requires significant investments and opening an array of investment opportunities for both strategic partners and reliable investors.

Mining of metal ores, as a GDP share (gross value added - current prices) was 0.34% in 2016., 0,39% in 2017., 0,36% in 2018., up to 0,28% in 2019. Over the last few years share of the mining has increased in 0,24% when it comes to GDP structure. Total share of the sector is significant giving 9,14% of the total increase in 2019. Realized value of gross production in 2019 amounts to 5.4 billion KM (app. 2,7 billion EURO). Through 2020 numbers continuously grow.

Other important activities for the mentioned sector are:

Export share of iron and steel is 849 million KM, recording 390 million KM increase or 85% in 2021.


Main export markets of the mentioned ores are Serbia, Romania, Turkey, Croatia and Slovenia.

Import share of iron and steel in 2021 is 973 million KM, recording 418 million KM increase or 75%. Main import markets of the mentioned ores are Italy, Serbia, Slovenia, Austria and Hungary.

Negative export trend in non-ferrous metals was related to the closure of Aluminij d.d. Mostar in 2019, while pandemic problems in 2020 created another decrease of export. But end of 2020 brought new positive signs and production started all over again. In a coming period when the situation all over the world become better, increase is definitely expected.

One of the most successful foreign investments in BiH within the mining sector is the lead investment in the

Olovo Ore Mining (the activities of Geomot d.o.o. and investor MINECO from Great Britain), the interest of ArcelorMitta and Israel Investment Group has been announced for the remainder of the Ljubija Iron ore mine. New metal foundries have been published (more in the section of mining below). Within the framework of mining and based on previously issued concessions, the activities of foreign investors are expected as well as significant increase in that field of work.

According to the statistical data total income of metal production (auto components – subsector) and electro industry of FDI by December of 2020 was 619.17 million EURO, presenting 8,0% of total foreign investments (7,72 billion EURO).

- Motor vehicles, trailers and semitrailers 1,60%
- Base metals 3.20%.
- Production of computers and different devices 0,30%

Foreign investor's access in to a metal sector would have enabled flow of local company's access towards new technologies, knowhow system and administrative skills. That also includes domestic companies into a regional and global business networks as well as additional capital for investments in order to increase productivity and competitiveness of the companies.

INVESTMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Strong development and permanent production growth that characterized Bosnia and Herzegovina metal sector is considerably below its real potentials and expected performances.

The existing structure of the metal sector in Bosnia and Herzegovina, characterized with small companies provide huge chances for large integrator companies of the sector, to integrate existing primary producers and to start their operations.

In order to make more attractive investment climate within the particular sector it is important to make a following steps:

- Production growth with the higher added value
- Partnership with the international companies
- Technologies innovations
- Privatization and reconstruction opportunities
- Establishing of the quality certification institution (particularly important for the export oriented companies).

Domestic metal companies are already recognized as reliable partners by present foreign investors.


Employee number and salaries






Production of the motor vehicles and base metals for the period from 2010 - 2021



GDP Share for the production of the machines, devices, motor vehicles and other transport means




FDI Share in metal and electro industry – 2020

Thermoplastic processing also follows the trend of development so some companies are already recognized exporters.




HUMAN RESOURCES AND EDUCATION

Bosnia and Herzegovina's ICT sector has started to flourish during the past few years and represents one of growth area in the economy of the country.

The data that in the past several years incomes of IT companies in B&H increased by approximately 25%, from year to year, speak in favor of the fact that IT industry is in expansion, with a trend of long-term continuous growth

According to analyses conducted by Bit Alliance at B&H level in 2017 and 2018, it is important to highlight that the average income per IT engineer amounts to about BAM 120,000, and there are presently about 4,000 of them in the labour market. Our companies belong to both groups of the companies for the development of IT solutions, both those who develop their own IT solutions and record a moderate trend of growth and those who perform IT services for foreign companies (outsourcing). This is currently one of the most represented segments of IT activities that opens an opportunity for rapid growth and employment of quality personnel with regard to insatiable needs of the world's markets.

It has been estimated that with educating 1,000 new IT engineers Bosnia and Herzegovina can possibly earn an income of about 120 million BAM per annum. For comparison purposes, in Timisoara, which is in terms of a number of inhabitants approximate to that of Sarajevo, educational system educates about 7,000 IT engineers per annum, and the whole Romania has about 150,000 IT experts. It is important to emphasize that the world's total deficit in IT engineers is about 2 million, and that number increases every year.

HUB387's mission is to build a vibrant IT community, a space where aspiring IT companies and individuals will connect and collaborate; where interaction with peers will facilitate new ideas and solutions to challenges in our workplace.

BUSINESS PROCESS OUTSOURCING INDUSTRY GROWTH

According to the analysis of Marisa Mejric, IT-BPO Expert, the early adopters initially earmarked Bosnia & Herzegovina for its ITO, with a healthy number of solely exported-oriented companies and daughter operations of North American and European counterparts establishing themselves. Soon after, customer management and other horizontal BPO positions became part of a continuing second-wave of growth buoyed by widespread conversational German and English skills, strong socio-cultural affinities, and the significant proportion of unemployed college and university graduates. The strong multilingual capabilities and transferable skills of the population have already been leveraged by several larger players (CCC, DDC, Teleperformance, Trizma) and a healthy number of small and medium-sized providers.

ECONOMIC BENEFITS FROM SOFTWARE INDUSTRY DEVELOPMENT IN BOSNIA AND HERZEGOVINA

According to the BIT Alliance (the leading association of software industry companies in BiH), their member-companies are exported oriented, recording 20 mill EUR worth of export only in 2015 and employing 700 staff members, mainly highly qualifies ones.

According to the preliminary analysis of BIT Alliance, the annual income per software engineer ranges between 40 000 and 60 000 EUR. For example, training of a new 1.000 software engineers BiH could generate, primary from export, more than 45 mill EUR per year.



HUMAN CAPITAL

Bosnia and Herzegovina possesses a growing labour force skilled in various aspects of ICT design, management, and applications. Young, educated and innovated workers from BiH are participating in international project and companies.

It is estimated that at present there are 6.000 programmers in Bosnia and Herzegovina. IT engineers from BiH, in terms of their knowledge, skills, experience and insight into modern trends, are frequently ahead of their colleagues in other European countries.

The value of software industry is reflected in the fact that 60-70% of its labour in BiH constitute young people up to the age of 35. According to the latest research of Bit Alliance, B&H is currently

facing a deficit of about 6,000 people in IT sector thus missing an opportunity to generate about 1.5 billion BAM on annual basis on environmentally clean jobs with excellent working conditions, which would result in reducing the unemployment rate and the youth outflow.

Without compromising quality, Bosnia and Herzegovina offers a competitively-priced skilled workforce. In Sarajevo (capital of Bosnia and Herzegovina), the monthly salary costs for a number of commonly-sought shared services centre positions are presented in the table below.




Types of services delivered

With high tertiary enrolment rates, the country is fortunate to possess great depth in its human capital, providing an optimal environment for BPO vendors looking to hire, retain, and replace career-oriented professionals. Notwithstanding the 150,000+ higher-educated English-speaking and 27,500+ Germanspeaking citizens under the age of fifty currently employed in the service industries, there exists a substantial number of similarly qualified and skilled workers presently outside of employment. Due to the low demand for labour, an estimated 140,000+ well-qualified Englishspeakers and 30,000+ German- speakers are registered as unemployed, approximately half of which can be classified as highly-active job-seekers. BPO/KPO vendors also stand to benefit from the healthy pipeline of English and German speakers emerging from the education system. An estimated 300,000+ people below the age of thirty are currently learning German. Talent in the region also comes at a lower cost than in neighbouring Central and Eastern Europe countries, without a loss in quality.

ATRACTIVE SECTORS

Indeed, many shared services centres in the Visegrad countries have been importing Bosnian talent for a number of years.

According to the Marisa Mejric, IT-BPO Expert, human capital potentials are:

- Estimated 140,000+ advanced English-speakers and 30,000+ advanced German- speakers presently un- or under-employed 300,000+ secondary school and university students taking German language classes; 60%+ growth in German language acquisition from 2010 baseline
- Very high youth unemployment rate (45.8%), including among university graduates with technical and business degrees; an average gap between education and first employment of around 8 months; 125,000+seeking first-time employment
- High social proximity where youth share strong European values and emotional closeness to customer markets; significant minority of diaspora returnees
- Deep pools of un- and under-employed talent educated in business, finance and accountancy, law, marketing and technical professions such as architecture, design, and engineering



OFFICE MARKET

Recent years have seen an upturn in the quality of available business premises, with both new construction and refurbishments in prime city locations. The municipalities of Centar, Novo Sarajevo, and Novi Grad offer the best combination of real estate quality and connectivity, though less expensive real estate and pleasant surroundings can also be found on the university and airport

side of town in Ilidža. A little further afield, in adjacent suburbs, rates range from as low as 5 – 9 EUR per square metre. The size and layout of the city is such that, with moderate traffic, few places within city limits are more than 10-15 minutes commuting time to the central business district. It is equally possible to travel across the whole city from east to west and arrive at the airport within 20 minutes.



Abundance of fertile uncultivated and unpolluted land


About half of the B&H land area is agricultural land where 2.4 million hectares comprise approximately 1.2 million ha of arable land, 100.000 ha of orchards and vineyards, 500.000 ha of improved grazing land, and 850.00 ha of mountain pastures. Around 1,800 ha of greenhouses area in BiH.

BIH's varied topography and climate conditions allow for longer growing and harvesting seasons

The climate is predominantly moderate continental, particularly characteristic of Central B&H, while the northern part of the country has a mostly continental climate. South of the country has a Sub-Mediterranean climate, characterized by long, summers and short, mild winters, with more than 200 sunny days and 1400 l/m2 of rainfall per year.




BiH is among the leading world producers of raspberries, plums, and strawberries and produces significant quantities of high-quality vegetables: potatoes, peppers, cabbage, and cucumbers as well as beans, onions, but lettuce, carrots, garlic, cantaloupe, watermelon, beetroot are also frequently grown. In vegetable production, the production in the protected areas (greenhouses) registered the highest increase. The most important fruit corps in 2021 (according to the data of the Agency for Statistics of BiH are




According to the data of the Foreign Trade Chamber of Bosnia and Herzegovina for 2021, the value of exports of edible fruits and nuts in 2021 amounted to 151.6 million BAM, which is an increase of 16.6% compared to 2020. The most important export markets for fruit are Serbia (50.0 million BAM), Germany (with 25.1), Croatia (11.6), the Russian Federation (8.8 million BAM), and France (8.7 million BAM). Exports are dominated by frozen raspberries.

In 2021, the export of edible vegetables amounted to 50.6 million BAM, which is an increase of 1.9% compared to 2020 (top export markets are Germany, Croatia, Switzerland, Slovenia, Italy, etc.). Exports are dominated by fresh gherkins and cucumbers and dried mushrooms.






The main fruit crops, produced in tons in 2021 Source: BiH' Agency for Statistics





The top export markets in 2021 are Croatia (94%) and Serbia (4%).


Structure of total sale of agricultural products on green markets in 2021.




Share of the group of agricultural products in total value of purchase and direct sale 2021.



Milk production, 000 litres




Collected cow's milk products obtained. December 2021

The total value of milk exports in 2021 amounts to 93.9 million BAM, and in 2020 it amounts to 94 million BAM, which is a slight decrease of -0.1%. The top export markets are CEFTA countries. The top export markets are Montenegro, Serbia, and Croatia. Exports are dominated by UHT milk and yogurts.




Meat and meat products were exported in the amount of 110 million BAM (3.9% more than exports in 2020), of which over 50% is exported to the CEFTA market and most to Serbia. Exports are dominated by canned chicken products, fresh beef, and poultry.


Employed persons by groups of sections of economic activities, BiH (%)





According to the "Labour Force Survey", IV quarter 2021, the structure of employed persons by groups of sections of economic activities shows that 56,7% of them work in services, then 34,8% work in industry and construction, and 8,5% work in agriculture, forestry, and fishing. More precise data on the number of employees are available for the third quarter of 2021 when they amounted to 117,000 in the primary agricultural activity, and the share was 9.97% in the total number of employees. There are over 1.500 registered companies in the country which operate within the agro-industry.

Export growth by sector (2021/2020)






The volume of trade in the food sector has increased, due to an increase in both exports and imports. Exports amount to € 492 million, an increase of 6%. Milk and dairy products, meat and meat products, and fruits and vegetables participate the most in exports and imports. The most important foreign trade partners are the EU countries and the countries that are signatories to the CEFTA agreement.

Other important facts

- Fruits and vegetables privileged growing conditions thanks to fertile and unpolluted soils, an abundance of freshwater resources, and favorable and varied climatic conditions remain an untapped resource at very competitive costs.
- The vast number of rivers and lakes offer great opportunities for fish farming.
- Excellent opportunities for the production of Halal meat and foods in general.
- Access to markets with more than 600 million consumers: EFTA and CEFTA member states, Turkey and Preferential Trade Agreement with EU countries,
- Attractive location bordering the EU (Croatia), Serbia, Montenegro, and the Adriatic Sea: an excellent platform to reach Central and Eastern Europe, the Middle East, and West Asia.
- Maximum 1 to 2-day truck transport to most EU markets.
- Relatively small distance between major fruits and vegetable production areas within BiH maximum 100 km.
- Excellent opportunity to cover the Balkan market demand as well as BIH, which imports over 75% of its food and agricultural product needs.
- Opportunity for organic production for most of agricultural products.
- Average market prices for raspberries and plums in BIH are the lowest among the top 10 producing countries.
- The country has a long tradition in agriculture which represents an excellent ground for applying new, modern production and processing technologies.
- Modern processing capacities are available for fruit & vegetable value-added products. Current BiH fruit and vegetable production vastly exceeds existing cool storage and processing capacities, while demand is consistently growing and over 75% of food in the country is imported.





Number of students 2020/2021







MEDICINAL AND AROMATIC PLANTS, HONEY, MUSHROOMS, AND WILD FOREST PRODUCTS

Bosnian medicinal herbs are above all European standards in terms of quality, and all BiH brands based on medicinal herbs, both in BiH and abroad, have been awarded gold medals.

The very rich biodiversity of medicinal and aromatic plants and mushrooms in the area of Bosnia and Herzegovina has the potential to contribute substantially to the national economy.


- It is believed that Bosnia and Herzegovina has over 700 species of medicinal and aromatic plants of which around 200 are exploited (balm, immortelle, juniper, chamomile, lavender, mint, rosemary, sage, savory, etc)
- The annual harvesting in BiH varies from 1.500 to 9.000 tons. The value of exports of essential oils in the period 2021 amounted to 3,445,523 BAM, which is 22.25% less than in 2020.

Diversity of climate and vegetation, clean environment, and tradition in beekeeping are good preconditions for the production of high-quality honey in BiH. The main beekeeping products are honey, beeswax, royal jelly, pollen, and bee venom.

-There are several varieties of honey produced in BiH, depending on the geographic region. Sage, Heather, Jerusalem Thorn, Dalmatian Laburnum, and Tangerine honey are produced by the beekeepers from the southern part of BiH, and Chestnut Sunflower Alfalfa and Acacia honey are produced

in the northern part of BIH.

- honey production in BiH cannot cover the needs of the local market.



BAKERIES, FLOUR MILLS, AND EDIBLE OIL PRODUCTION

Market leaders (flour mills/bakeries) are KLAS and SPRING, both belonging to MIMS Group from Sarajevo. Also, there are a number of small and medium-sized companies. BIMAL Brčko is BiH's sole edible oil producing company, with crushing, refining, and bottling capacities. The leading flour export markets were Turkey, Montenegro, and Northern Macedonia,

Exports of products from the milling industry and malt and starch reached the value of 12,508,770 BAM (26.46% less than last year).

SUGAR FACTORIES, SUGAR PRODUCTION

Companies STUDEN and AGRANA from Austria, have built a sugar refinery in Brčko District of BiH, STUDEN - AGRANA RAFINERIJA ŠEĆERA. After 18 years of standstill, the sugar plant of FABRIKA ŠEĆERA in Bijeljina started operating again in 2010. The plant's daily processing capacity is 4,000 tons of sugar beet and production of 500 tons of sugar. BiH still has some unused customs-free quota for the export of sugar to the EU.

The value of exports of sugar and sugar products in 2021 amounted to 3,358,157 BAM, which is 44 42% less than in 2020

WINE

The culture of wine growing and wine production in Bosnia and Herzegovina dates back to the period of the Illyrian and the Thracians, who introduced the grapevine seedlings to the Balkans. Herzegovinian winemakers aspire to be recognized for Žilavka and Blatina as unique grape varieties in the world of wine and to present themselves to the world through the wine that captures the savor of the soil and the fervency of the Herzegovinian sun. The BiH wine growing takes place in Herzegovina region near City of Mostar and the area of Municipalities of Čitluk, Stolac, Ljubuški, Trebinje and Čapljina.

Wine producers from Bosnia and Herzegovina have won numerous awards from the most prestigious and acclaimed competitions in the wine industry.

The value of wine exports in 2021 amounted to 6,457,147 BAM, which is 18.48% more than in 2020.



FISH FARMING

The abundance of the clear, unpolluted rivers and streams that cross the country presents huge potential for both family-owned and industrial size fish farming production. Fish farming is already developed, especially trout and carp rising.

Fish species:

The most important fish species in the aquaculture sector in Bosnia and Herzegovina are:

- Salmon species: rainbow trout, brown trout, and brook trout
- Cyprinid species: common carp, grass carp, silver carp, and welsh catfish
- Marine species: European seabass gilthead sea bream and common dentex
- Mollusks: Mediterranean mussel and European flat oyster

Farming systems distribution and characteristics

In Bosnia and Herzegovina, fish farms are generally distributed in three main regions.

- In Northern BiH there are 5 cyprinid fish farms with a total area of 3,276 ha.
- In the River Neretva and the River Vrbas there are 40 concrete salmonid fish farms of 8.5 ha and floating cage fish farms of 8.1 ha.
- Marine aquaculture in 2 cage farms, with a total area of 3.6 ha, is located in Neum, a town on the Adriatic coast
- In 2021 there was a total increase in exports of fish, mollusks, and fish products of 23.3% (58.479.411 BAM) compared to 2020.

GENERAL OVERVIEW FOR INVESTORS IN THE TEXTILES, CLOTHING, LEATHER AND FOOTWEAR SECTOR

Production is mainly based on "lohn" jobs for foreign partners (sewing, tailoring, finishing, assembly services) with a very small share of production of own products. Although the dominant place is occupied by internal finishing and processing, this industry in recent years have a good export results.

The textile, clothing, leather and footwear industry is import dependent in terms of imports of raw materials that are mainly not produced in Bosnia and Herzegovina, and production is organized in small (up to 50 employees) and medium enterprises (up to 200 employees) with a wide spatial dispersion of production capacities.

The structure of textile industry products has a wide range from: men's and women's heavy clothing, light clothing, sportswear and equipment, car upholstery, underwear, protective clothing and equipment, to medical and cooking programs, home and hotel textiles, carpets, rugs and other products.

The structure of leather and footwear products includes all processes: from raw leather and wool processing (which requires special process and treatment), through sewing men's, women's and children's clothing, haberdashery accessories and other leather products, to the production of men's, women's and children's footwear, everyday footwear, special-purpose footwear for various ceremonies, work, sports, protective footwear, footwear for different seasons, etc.

TRADITION OF THE SECTOR IN B&H:

- Beginnings of the B&H textile industries date back to the beginning of the last century when production was based on craft principles. This method of production will soon be replaced by modern, up-to-date textile production facilities.
- The trend of development of this branch of industry continued until the beginning of the last war. BiH has achieved exceptional results and greatly contributed to the foreign trade balance of the former state. Smaller industrial plants were present in all parts of the country, while the creation of industrial plants completely completed the production cycle so that the production and processing of textiles and the production of finished products were part of the same industrial unit. The production of domestic clothing brands and finishing, so-called lohn jobs was in the ratio of 70:30, and not only the Yugoslav but also the world market was open for the placement of both types of products.
- The problematic period for this industry begins with the disintegration of ex-Yugoslavia (1990s) when most production plants were devastated (by transitional processes from a planned to a market economy), and a technological breakthrough after the war was virtually impossible.
- In the last two decades, the textile, clothing, leather and footwear sector in B&H has shown a tendency of continuous growth and development as well as the need for continuous investment in new technologies and improving the skills of employees. A key element of new investments in technological improvements of production processes and raising the level of knowledge and skills of employees (know-how) are foreign investments whose higher inflow is expected in the

The "Sportek" footwear factory is engaged in the serial production of sports footwear - professional models for football players - football boots for the "Nike" corporation (in which the world's best football player Cristiano Ronaldo and many other world football stars play). I especially emphasize the fact that from 2008 to 2020, our designer from Italy always won the first prize in the annual competitions for the new design of football boots that the company "Nike" announces every year in the world. They also produce a complete professional cycling program (except helmets and goggles) for the DMT brand, which is owned by our parent company "Diamond" from Italy, and we have a special line for the production, sewing and printing of a complete program of textiles for cyclists (socks, t-shirts, pants, sweatshirts, etc.). In addition, we have been doing serial production of footwear for the American company "Crocs" (summer slippers and clogs) for many years. Annually, we make and export about 4,000,000 pairs of shoes for this company. In addition to this, our activity includes the production of carbon fiber parts for Ducatti motorcycles and DMT bicycles (a large part of the competitors in the race "Giro d'Italia", and this year's winner, wears equipment produced in "Sportek"), as well as roofs for smaller yachts made of carbon textiles.



Key parameters of the ATTRACTIVENESS of the sector.

Although all the forecasts of economic experts for 2021 (due to the COVID 19 pandemic) indicated possible negative trends, statistics show that in 2021, the multi-year growth trend of the textile and leather industry continued.

In 2021, B&H produced a total of:


- 730 million KM of textile products and
- 963.9 million KM of various leather products, which is an increase of 10.82% compared to 2020

Number of employees and average salary:

- According to the number of employees, the textile, clothing, leather and footwear industry in BiH
 employs the most workers, about 40,000 people (according to the STK BiH analysis), which is
 still only 40% of total employees in the sector before the transition when this industry employed
 100,000 people.
- The number of employees in the textile, leather and footwear sector is approximately 22% of the total number of employees registered at the end of 2021 in the manufacturing industry of BiH.
- The textile and footwear industry is predominantly female. It is estimated that more than 75 percent of workers in the textile and footwear industry are women.
- The largest number of workers is represented in two age groups, between 20 and 30 (42%), and 31 and 40 years (37%) age. According to the level of education, as many as 99 percent of workers have a high school diploma, which includes skilled workers.
- The average monthly net salary is between 650 and 700 KM, for 48 working hours during the week.







Export

- In 2021, the textile industry was exported in the amount of 1.53 billion KM, which is an increase in exports by 157 million KM or 12% compared to the previous year, which ranked this industry in the fifth place of importance in B&H.
- At the same time, textile products worth 2 billion KM were imported, which is an increase of 284 million KM or 16% compared to the previous year.
- The coverage of imports by exports in 2021 is 75.01% and is lower by 3.07% compared to 2020 when it amounted to 78.08%.
- The share of the textile, clothing, leather and footwear industry in the total foreign trade of the country in 2021 amounted to 10.28% and increased by 1.28% compared to the same period in 2020 when the share was 9%.
- Footwear, clothing and clothing parts are at the forefront of the exchange. We exported footwear in the total value of KM 714 million, which is KM 70 million or 11% more than in the previous year.
- Clothing and clothing parts were exported in the amount of 609 million KM, which is an increase of over 60 million KM or 10% compared to the previous year.
- As in previous years, the most important markets in the trade of textiles, clothing, leather and footwear are the EU countries, where Italy, Germany and Croatia are again in the lead.
- The other most important markets are the CEFTA countries, and in imports there are also Turkey and China.



In 2021, the largest export markets where textile, clothing, leather and footwear products were placed are: Italy (30%), Germany (18%), Croatia (15%), France (7%) and Slovenia (7%).
